Jenny Starr is the chief administrative law judge of the Minnesota Office of Administrative Hearings, appointed by Governor Walz on September 3, 2019, to serve a six-year term. Prior to her chief ALJ appointment, she was the assistant commissioner at the Minnesota Department of Revenue. Other significant work history includes providing free legal services to low-income families at Legal Assistance of Dakota County, clerking at the Minnesota Court of Appeals, and teaching as an adjunct professor at Mitchell Hamline College of Law. Starr graduated cum laude from the University of Minnesota Law School, and summa cum laude from the University of Minnesota College of Liberal Arts.

Jacqueline Cavanaugh is a management analyst with the Minnesota Department of Health.
