



Developmental and Social-Emotional Screening in Early Childhood

CHILD AND TEEN CHECKUPS (C&TC) FACT SHEET FOR PRIMARY CARE PROVIDERS

C&TC Requirements

General

Developmental surveillance is required at all C&TC visits. Routine and periodic screening using a recommended standardized instrument is strongly recommended.

- Developmental screening at nine, 18, and 30 months of age and once between three and five years of age
- Social-emotional screening at six months of age, continuing every six months through two years of age, then yearly

Personnel

A licensed health care provider must perform surveillance: physician, nurse practitioner, physician assistant, or a registered or public health nurse (RN or PHN) who has completed the C&TC Comprehensive Screening training through the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH).

Screening personnel qualifications are instrument-specific; refer to each instrument's instruction manual for more information.

Documentation

Document developmental surveillance in the C&TC visit record. Documentation must include the name of the screening instrument(s) used, score(s), and screening result-specific anticipatory guidance provided to the parent or caregiver. Documentation of atypical screening results must include a plan of care and appropriate referrals.

Procedure

Surveillance

Surveillance includes obtaining parent or caregiver concerns about development, a history of the child's social-emotional and current functioning, making accurate observations of the child's development, identifying risk and protective factors, and accurately documenting findings.

Screening Instruments

Separate instruments are needed for developmental and social-emotional screening. Refer to <u>Instruments at a Glance for C&TC Clinic Settings</u> (health.state.mn.us).

Referral and Management

Review the screening results with the child's parent or caregiver. Do not wait and see when a concern is identified. Prompt referral, evaluation, and treatment can improve a child's long-term outcomes and developmental path.

Comprehensive Medical Evaluation

A comprehensive medical evaluation, performed by the primary care provider, determines further developmental evaluation, treatment, eligibility, and necessity for early intervention services.

Educational Evaluation

Refereither directly to the local school district or through <u>Help Me Grow</u> (<u>HelpMeGrowMN.org</u>) as soon as concerns are identified.

Mental Health Evaluation

Refer to the map of Early Childhood Mental Health services by county (dhs.state.mn.us) to find local providers.

Follow-Up

Establish a follow-up process with the family after referral to ensure access. With the parent's permission, coordinate with educational and other professionals. Close the loop by documenting referral results.

Provide developmental surveillance at every well visit and developmental

screening with a standardized instrument at specific ages and whenever surveillance demonstrates risk (Lipkin, Macias, & Council on Children with Disabilities, 2020).
