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## **Immunizations and Review**

#### CHILD AND TEEN CHECKUPS (C&TC) FACT SHEET FOR PRIMARY CARE PROVIDERS

### **C&TC** Requirements

#### General

A review of the immunization history is required at every C&TC visit to determine if the child is due or overdue for any vaccines (including COVID-19) according to the recommended Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) Immunization Schedules (cdc.gov).

Children and youth receiving care through C&TC must be given vaccines through the <u>Minnesota Vaccines for Children (MnVFC)</u> <u>Program (health.state.mn.us)</u>.

#### Personnel

A licensed health care provider must review the immunization record and follow up appropriately: physician, nurse practitioner, physician assistant, or registered or public health nurse (RN, PHN) who has completed the C&TC Comprehensive Screening training through the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH).

#### Documentation

Document that a patient's immunization history was assessed and immunizations were given. If immunizations were due but not given, document why and a plan for catch-up vaccines. Federal law requires providing the most current <u>Vaccine</u> <u>Information Statement (VIS) (immunize.org)</u> prior to immunization. Document that a VIS was given, date given, and publication date. Only written, dated documentation (pictures of this documentation, or electronic record) should be accepted as evidence of previous vaccination (Kroger, Bahta, Long, & Sanchez, 2023, p. 27). The <u>Minnesota Immunization Information</u> <u>Connection (MIIC) (health.state.mn.us)</u> stores records to assess a patient's immunization history.

### Procedure

Refer to specific vaccine administration guidelines at <u>MDH Immunization Best</u> <u>Practices (health.state.mn.us)</u>

Give VIS and information to help parents anticipate and manage potential mild side effects. The ACIP does not recommend antipyretics before or at the time of vaccination (Kroger, Bahta, Long, & Sanchez, 2023). Medications may be given for fever or pain after vaccination if needed.

Report significant adverse events to the <u>Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System</u> <u>(VAERS) (vaers.hhs.gov)</u> even if there is no known causal relationship to vaccination.

### Addressing Vaccine Concerns

Most parents vaccinate their children, but some will have vaccine questions and/or concerns. If a vaccine is refused at a C&TC visit, Medical Assistance can now be billed for stand-alone vaccination counseling visits <u>Child and Teen Checkups: Vaccine</u> <u>Counseling (state.mn.us)</u>.
