Age	Typical Hearing/Speech Behavior
Birth to 3 months	<ul> <li>Startles to loud sounds</li> <li>Quiets or smiles when spoken to</li> <li>Seems to recognize your voice and quiets if crying</li> <li>Increases or decreases sucking behavior in response to sound</li> <li>Makes cooing sounds</li> <li>Cries differently for different needs</li> <li>Smiles</li> </ul>
3 to 6 months	<ul> <li>Looks or turns toward a new sound</li> <li>Responds to changes in tone of your voice</li> <li>Makes sounds when happy or upset</li> <li>Enjoys rattles and other toys that make sounds</li> <li>Babbling sounds more speech-like (such as ooh, aah, and ba-ba)</li> </ul>
6 to 12 months	<ul> <li>Enjoys games like peek-a-boo and pat-a-cake</li> <li>Responds to common sounds, someone's voice (even if not loud)</li> <li>Knows words for common things (cup, shoe) and phrases ("bye-bye")</li> <li>Imitates different speech sounds</li> <li>Starts to respond to requests ("come here")</li> <li>Looks at things or pictures when someone talks about them</li> <li>Says one or two words ("bye-bye", "mama"), but may not be clear</li> </ul>
>12 months to 2 years	<ul> <li>Begins using 2 word together ("want more")</li> <li>Uses many different sounds at the beginning of words</li> <li>Can begin pointing to body parts when asked</li> <li>Learns new words on a regular basis</li> </ul>
