WHEREAS: Over 60% of pregnancy deaths are preventable, and according to the Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention, Black women in the United States are 3-4 times more likely than white women to die from

pregnancy-related causes; and

WHEREAS: While just 6.3% of Minnesotans are Black, Black women represent 22.9% of the maternal deaths in our state;

and

WHEREAS: Black women suffer from life threatening complications known as maternal morbidities at a rate of twice that

of white women; and

WHEREAS: The high rates of maternal mortality among Black women span across income levels, education levels,

socioeconomic status, access to prenatal care, general overall health, and mental health and substance use

disorder status; and

The state of Minnesota recognizes that structural racism, gender oppression, and inequities in the social determinants of health are embedded in many institutions and contribute to unacceptable and preventable WHEREAS:

disparities in Black maternal health outcomes; and

WHEREAS: The Black Maternal Health Caucus was founded in the Minnesota House of Representatives in 2021 and its

members have worked tirelessly to bring attention and action to this issue in the Minnesota State Legislature

and across the state; and

WHEREAS: $Black\ Maternal\ Health\ Week\ is\ an\ opportunity\ to\ acknowledge\ the\ tragic\ deaths\ of\ Black\ women\ in\ our\ state$

and across the country who lost their lives to pregnancy related complications and to raise awareness of the state's preventable and unacceptable disparities in Black maternal health outcomes; and

WHEREAS:

Black Maternal Health Week is also a time to stand in solidarity, recognizing that this issue impacts Black mothers, Indigenous mothers, and other mothers of color, as well as trans people, gender expansive people, families, communities, and practitioners, who all experience the weight of systemic bias. It is our job to uplift community-based responses to addressing this crisis and to promote initiatives to reduce Black maternal

morbidity and mortality; and

WHEREAS:

Through the One Minnesota Healthy Beginnings goal and the collective efforts around the state led by Black women, providers, community leaders, and families, we can work towards eliminating disparities in our

maternal healthcare system; and

WHEREAS: We affirm the need to improve our maternal care systems and invest in improving Black maternal health outcomes, as well as the need to acknowledge the historical and systemic exploitation of Black bodies within

the medical field and to encourage practitioners to listen to and believe Black women seeking medical care.
