News from the Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS)

Health Care Program Eligibility Renewals

The most important thing enrollees can do to maintain their coverage is to make sure they have updated their contact information. The Department of Human Services needs to be able to reach enrollees with important paperwork about how to keep their insurance when it's time for them to complete their renewal. Visits and Immunizations

On-time C&TC visits, according to the <u>C&TC</u> Schedule of Age-Related Screening Standards (edocs.dhs.state.mn.us), is key to keeping kids healthy and ready to learn. Gaps in care and vaccinations may persist from the COVID pandemic. The <u>Keep Your Kids on Track (health.state.mn.us)</u> resource can be used to guide conversations with families about the importance of regular preventive care, including vaccinations.

Silver Diamine Fluoride (SDF) Use in the Medical Setting

The American Medical Association recently approved a CPT code for SDF use in the medical setting to help combat oral health caries. Providers can now bill for this service

when provided during a C&TC visit. See the Minnesota Health Care Programs (MHCP)

Early Childhood Screening

A new district early childhood health and developmental screening law (Statutes 121A.17 Subdivision 3, 2023) allows virtual screening for families with immunocompromised or other health concerns. Parents may also request a copy of a completed Child and Teen Checkup visit between ages 3-6 years which includes vision, hearing, immunizations, results of developmental and social emotional screening tools such as the Ages and Stages Questionnaire: 3 and Ages and Stages Questionnaire: SE-2 to submit to their district.

For all other families, if your clinic completes: Minneapolis Preschool Screening Instrument Revised,
Developmental Indicators for the Assessment of Learning 4, Brigance III, or Battelle 3, a parent may request a copy (with vision, hearing, and immunizations) to submit to the district. If your clinic does not complete one of these observational tools, please refer parents of 3- to 6 year-olds to HelpMeConnect

SWYC

The Survey of Well-being of Young Children (SWYC) Baby Pediatric Symptom Checklist (BPSC) and Preschool Pediatric Symptom Checklist (PPSC) may be used for socialemotional screening for children under 5 years of age in the C&TC clinic setting. These parent report tools have acceptable psychometric properties according to the American Academy of Pediatrics. The Minnesota Health Care Programs (MHCP) **Provider Manual C&TC section** (dhs.state.mn.us), and the C&TC **Developmental and Social Emotional** Screening in the Clinic Setting (health.state.mn.us) webpages are being updated to reflect this change. Firearms are the leading cause of death for 0–24-year-olds in the United States; this is higher than deaths from motor vehicle crashes.

2023-2024 COVID-19 Vaccine Recommendations

On September 12, 2023, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommended a new 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine for everyone ages 6 months and older. This vaccine is expected to provide better protection against variants that are currently making people sick. There are three different vaccines available: Pfizer, Moderna, and Novavax (Note: Novavax is only authorized for people 12 years of age and older). The CDC does not recommend one of the vaccines over the other.

- Children 6 months through 4 years of age should complete a primary series including either 2 doses of Moderna or 3 doses of Pfizer vaccine, with at least one of the doses being the new 2023-2024 mRNA COVID-19 vaccine. If they had completed a primary series prior, one dose of the new 2023-2024 vaccine should be given at least 2 months after any previous dose.
- People 5 years of age and older should receive 1 dose of the new 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine. If they have received any previous COVID-19 vaccine, the new 2023-2024 vaccine should be given at least 2 months after any previous dose.
- People who are immunocompromised should have 3 doses with at least one of the doses being the new 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine. They may also receive additional 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine doses based on their clinical situation.

Mental Health Support from NAMI

To help with the mental health crisis among teens and young adults, National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) has officially launched the new NAMI Teen & Young Adult (T&YA) HelpLine, a free, nationwide peer-support service providing information, resource referrals and support to teens and young adults. It provides a safe space for young people to connect with peers who understand their struggles and offers them resources and information that help.

Lead

Children's blood lead levels tend to increase from 6 to 12 months of age and peak between 18 and 24 months of age. Blood lead tests at ages 12 and 24 months of age are required for Child and Teen Checkups. C&TC PROVIDER UPDATES - FALL 2023

In 2022, legislation was passed that lowered the definition of an elevated blood lead level (EBLL) from 5 to 3.5 mcg/dL. This changes the level at which education will need to be provided. Until new guidelines are released, health care providers are encouraged to follow the existing blood lead level guidelines linked above. Healthcare providers should use their clinical judgment on the frequency of follow-up testing for blood lead levels of 3.5-4.9 mcg/dL; as a benchmark, current guidelines recommend follow-up tests within 3 months of a venous result of 5-14.9 mcg/dL.
